

Sorting Guide

Food waste and residual waste must be placed in plastic bags. Tie the bags with double knots.

Sort packaging material, food waste and residual waste into the different waste bins in your residence's sorting room. Sort bulk waste, textiles and hazardous waste at a recycling centre. ● Coloured and clear glass packaging

- Here you can only sort glass that has been used as packaging.
- Other types of glass, such as drinking glasses, vases, window glass and other objects, can be sorted at a recycling centre or placed in a bag containing residual waste (small amounts).
- Sort coloured and clear glass separately.
- Remove corks, caps and lids and sort them separately.
- Always empty the packaging of its contents.
- Light sources are sorted as hazardous waste.

● Bulk waste

- Is the waste too big to fit in a regular plastic bag? If so, it is bulk waste and must be sorted at a staffed recycling centre: Kvitten or Läggesta.
- You are responsible for transporting the waste to the recycling centre and sorting it in the different containers according to material type.
- Examples of bulk waste: bicycles, Christmas trees, saucepans, mattresses, furniture, rugs, sledges, frying pans, large toys, blankets.

● Hazardous waste and electronics

- Hazardous waste and electronics are sorted in the environmental shed at a recycling centre (if sorting is not available in your residence's sorting room).
- Examples of hazardous waste: batteries, chemicals, halogen light bulbs, LED lights, other light sources, varnish, solvents, glue, paint, nail polish.
- Examples of electronics: computers, headphones, charging cables, products with a cord, plugs, torches, batteries, vapes, electronic toys.

Empty the packaging of its contents and flatten it to save space.
